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Definition of Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder₍₁₎

Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-5, American Psychiatric Association [APA], 2013) states that ADHD is a learning difficulty rather than a behavioral one.

- The presence of ADHD is on average 5% worldwide.
- Approximately 5 to 10% of children who are schoolage face some problems in their learning or social functioning because of ADHD in the United States and universally.
- ADHD is originally hereditary, and it is not genderspecific.
- Children are more likely to be diagnosed with ADHD than adults, but it is a lifelong condition.

Most noticeable symptoms are:

Inattention

Hyperactivity

Impulsivity

Learning an additional language

Specific learning difficulties affect working memory negatively, therefore people who have such difficulties will struggle developing certain additional language skills.

Inattention in additional language learning

- specific writing difficulties
- spelling mistakes in single-word writing
- difficulty in processing verbal material

Hyperactivity and impulsivity in AL learning

- they might struggle to acquire effective sociopragmatic aspects of speaking skills
- incoherency in spelling, vocabulary and punctuation
- can influence production and social interaction in additional language




Figure 1. Language Output Problems of ADHD students
